## Introduction

Spiral Spinner (referred to as "Spiral" in the rest of this guide) is a variant of Spinner that uses a spiral shape rather than concentric rings. It is much more space-efficient, with the possibility of fitting multiple sentences in the space required for one normal Spinner word. It has some additional and different rules to allow for the new format.

Explanation

A word in Spiral is made up of the usual lines and dots, inside a spiral and demarcated by thick lines – one thick line to separate letter groups (which would be rings in Spinner), and two thick lines to separate words (these two lines are the "word separator"). The consonants and vowels are the same as in Spinner. Spirals are read from inner to outer.


Spirals begin with either an empty space *or* beginning punctuation, then a word separator. After the first word separator, writing begins.

Numbers are written by including a circle with an X through it within all letter group(/s) that make up the number.

Punctuation must be preceded and followed by a word separator or the beginning/end of the spiral, and connects to word separators as necessary. If multiple sentences are written in one spiral, punctuation that ends one sentence and



"[start here] 90210 888 1234567890" punctuation that starts the next are written in the same space between word separators, with gaps to avoid

ambiguity.

Spirals end with the final letter group, then a word separator, then any ending punctuation.
